Luke Chapter 7

7:28

For I say unto you, Among those that are born of women there is not a greater prophet than John the Baptist: but he that is least in the kingdom of God is greater than he.

Introduction

In the book of Luke, we read the words of Jesus in chapter 7: 7:28 "For I say unto you, Among those that are born of women there is not a greater prophet than John the Baptist: but he that is least in the kingdom of God is greater than he". I cannot tell you how many times I ponder this scripture verse. If so, then where do I stand in the kingdom of God? There is no way that I can compare myself with John the Baptist. I know that I am a sinner and have come short of the glory of God, for the bible says: Romans 3:23 "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God". For the wages of sin [is] death" Romans 6:23. Even the apostle Paul said in "Romans 7:24 "O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?". He goes on to say 7:25, "I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. For in Romans 6:23 we are told that though the wages of sin is death, he also says, "but gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord. Now, that is good news. For a moment I thought I was a goner, now I find there is still hope!! If you have felt the same way, then there is hope for you as well. You can have that hope if you except the gift that God offer's, which is "Life Eternal" and that only comes by accepting Jesus as your Lord and savior. It is a gift. It is nothing you can earn, it's a choice that you make. You can except that gift or reject it, it's up to you. The problem is that: Hosea 4:6 My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge: because thou hast rejected knowledge, I will also reject thee", says the Lord and in Ezekiel He says, 18:31 Cast away from you all your transgressions, whereby ye have transgressed; and make you a new heart and a new spirit: for why will ye die, O house of Israel? 18:32 For I have no pleasure in the death of him that dieth, saith the Lord GOD: wherefore turn [yourselves], and live ye. You may ask, how can I make a new heart and a new spirit? Let's aet some wisdom from the wise man. Take it slowly and digest it so that your soul will be enriched with knowledge and understanding. The Lord is

telling you through Solomon what you need to make that change in your heart and spirit.

Proverbs Chapters 1-29

Proverbs Chapter 1

1The proverbs of Solomon the son of David, king of Israel; 2To know wisdom and instruction; to perceive the words of understanding;

3To receive the instruction of wisdom, justice, and judgment, and equity;

4To give subtilty to the simple, to the young man knowledge and discretion.

5A wise man will hear, and will increase learning; and a man of understanding shall attain unto wise counsels:

6To understand a proverb, and the interpretation; the words of the wise, and their dark sayings.

7The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge: but fools despise wisdom and instruction.

8My son, hear the instruction of thy father, and forsake not the law of thy mother:

9For they shall be an ornament of grace unto thy head, and chains about thy neck.

10My son, if sinners entice thee, consent thou not.

11If they say, Come with us, let us lay wait for blood, let us lurk privily for the innocent without cause:

12Let us swallow them up alive as the grave; and whole, as those that go down into the pit:

13We shall find all precious substance, we shall fill our houses with spoil:

14Cast in thy lot among us; let us all have one purse:

15My son, walk not thou in the way with them; refrain thy foot from their path:

16For their feet run to evil, and make haste to shed blood. 17Surely in vain the net is spread in the sight of any bird. 18And they lay wait for their own blood; they lurk privily for their own lives.

19So are the ways of every one that is greedy of gain; which taketh away the life of the owners thereof.
20Wisdom crieth without; she uttereth her voice in the streets: 21She crieth in the chief place of concourse, in the openings of the gates: in the city she uttereth her words, saying, 22How long, ye simple ones, will ye love simplicity? and the scorners delight in their scorning, and fools hate knowledge? 23Turn you at my reproof: behold, I will pour out my spirit unto you, I will make known my words unto you.

24Because I have called, and ye refused; I have stretched out my hand, and no man regarded;

25But ye have set at nought all my counsel, and would none of my reproof:

26I also will laugh at your calamity; I will mock when your fear cometh;

27When your fear cometh as desolation, and your destruction cometh as a whirlwind; when distress and anguish cometh upon you.

28Then shall they call upon me, but I will not answer; they shall seek me early, but they shall not find me:

29For that they hated knowledge, and did not choose the fear of the LORD:

30They would none of my counsel: they despised all my reproof.

31Therefore shall they eat of the fruit of their own way, and be filled with their own devices.

32For the turning away of the simple shall slay them, and the prosperity of fools shall destroy them.

33But whoso hearkeneth unto me shall dwell safely, and shall be quiet from fear of evil.

- 1My son, if thou wilt receive my words, and hide my commandments with thee;
- 2So that thou incline thine ear unto wisdom, and apply thine heart to understanding;
- <u>3Yea, if thou criest after knowledge,</u> and <u>liftest up thy voice for understanding;</u>
- 4<u>If thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for her as for hid</u> <u>treasures;</u>
- 5Then shalt thou understand the fear of the LORD, and find the knowledge of God.
- 6For the LORD giveth wisdom: out of his
- mouth cometh knowledge and understanding.
- <u>7He layeth up sound wisdom for the righteous:</u> he is <u>a buckler</u> <u>to them that walk uprightly.</u>
- 8<u>He keepeth the paths of judgment, and preserveth the way of his saints.</u>
- 9<u>Then shalt thou understand righteousness, and judgment, and equity; yea, every good path.</u>
- 10When wisdom entereth into thine heart, and knowledge is pleasant unto thy soul;
- 11Discretion shall preserve thee, understanding shall keep thee:
- 12<u>To deliver thee from the way of the evil</u> man, <u>from the man</u> that speaketh froward things;
- 13Who leave the paths of uprightness, to walk in the ways of darkness;
- 14<u>Who rejoice to do evil, and delight in the frowardness of the</u> wicked;
- 15Whose ways are crooked, and they froward in their paths:
- 16<u>To deliver thee from the strange woman, even from the stranger which flattereth with her words;</u>
- 17Which forsaketh the guide of her youth, and forgetteth the covenant of her God.
- 18 For her house inclineth unto death, and her paths unto the dead.
- 19None that go unto her return again, neither take they hold of the paths of life.

- 20That thou mayest walk in the way of good men, and keep the paths of the righteous.
- 21For the upright shall dwell in the land, and the perfect shall remain in it.
- 22<u>But the wicked shall be cut off from the earth, and the transgressors shall be rooted out of it.</u>

- 1<u>My son, forget not my law; but let thine heart keep my</u> commandments:
- 2For length of days, and long life, and peace, shall they add to thee.
- 3Let not mercy and truth forsake thee: bind them about thy neck; write them upon the table of thine heart:
- 4<u>So shalt thou find favour and good understanding in the sight of God and man.</u>
- 5Trust in the LORD with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding.
- 6<u>In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths.</u>
- 7Be not wise in thine own eyes: fear the LORD, and depart from evil.
- 8<u>It shall be health to thy navel, and marrow to thy bones.</u>
- 9Honour the LORD with thy substance, and with the firstfruits of all thine increase:
- 10So shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses shall burst out with new wine.
- 11My son, despise not the chastening of the LORD; neither be weary of his correction:
- 12 For whom the LORD loveth he correcteth; even as a father the son in whom he delighteth.
- 13<u>Happy</u> is <u>the man</u> that <u>findeth wisdom, and the man</u> that <u>getteth understanding.</u>
- 14For the merchandise of it is better than the merchandise of silver, and the gain thereof than fine gold.
- 15<u>She</u> is <u>more precious than rubies: and all the things thou</u> <u>canst desire are not to be compared unto her.</u>

- 16<u>Length of days is in her right hand;</u> and <u>in her left hand</u> <u>riches and honour.</u>
- 17<u>Her ways</u> are <u>ways of pleasantness, and all her</u> <u>paths</u> are <u>peace.</u>
- 18<u>She</u> is a tree of life to them that lay hold upon her: and happy is every one that retaineth her.
- 19<u>The LORD by wisdom hath founded the earth; by understanding hath he established the heavens.</u>
- 20By his knowledge the depths are broken up, and the clouds drop down the dew.
- 21<u>My son, let not them depart from thine eyes: keep sound wisdom and discretion:</u>
- 22So shall they be life unto thy soul, and grace to thy neck.
- 23<u>Then shalt thou walk in thy way safely, and thy foot shall not</u> stumble.
- 24When thou liest down, thou shalt not be afraid: yea, thou shalt lie down, and thy sleep shall be sweet.
- 25Be not afraid of sudden fear, neither of the desolation of the wicked, when it cometh.
- 26For the LORD shall be thy confidence, and shall keep thy foot from being taken.
- 27Withhold not good from them to whom it is due, when it is in the power of thine hand to do it.
- 28<u>Say not unto thy neighbour, Go, and come again, and to morrow I will give; when thou hast it by thee.</u>
- 29<u>Devise not evil against thy neighbour, seeing he dwelleth</u> securely by thee.
- 30Strive not with a man without cause, if he have done thee no harm.
- 31<u>Envy thou not the oppressor, and choose none of his ways.</u> 32<u>For the froward is abomination to the LORD: but his</u> secret is with the righteous.
- 33The curse of the LORD is in the house of the wicked: but he blesseth the habitation of the just.
- 34Surely he scorneth the scorners: but he giveth grace unto the lowly.
- 35The wise shall inherit glory: but shame shall be the promotion of fools.

- 1Hear, ye children, the instruction of a father, and attend to know understanding.
- 2For I give you good doctrine, forsake ye not my law.
- <u>3For I was my father's son, tender and only beloved in the sight of my mother.</u>
- 4<u>He taught me also, and said unto me, Let thine heart retain my words: keep my commandments, and live.</u>
- <u>5Get wisdom, get understanding: forget it not; neither decline from the words of my mouth.</u>
- 6<u>Forsake her not, and she shall preserve thee: love her, and she shall keep thee.</u>
- 7<u>Wisdom</u> is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom: and with all thy getting get understanding.
- 8<u>Exalt her, and she shall promote thee: she shall bring thee to honour, when thou dost embrace her.</u>
- 9She shall give to thine head an ornament of grace: a crown of glory shall she deliver to thee.
- 10<u>Hear, O my son, and receive my sayings; and the years of thy life shall be many.</u>
- 11<u>I have taught thee in the way of wisdom; I have led thee in right paths.</u>
- 12When thou goest, thy steps shall not be straitened; and when thou runnest, thou shalt not stumble.
- 13<u>Take fast hold of instruction; let her not go: keep her; for she is thy life.</u>
- 14<u>Enter not into the path of the wicked, and go not in the way of evil</u> men.
- 15Avoid it, pass not by it, turn from it, and pass away.
- 16For they sleep not, except they have done mischief; and their sleep is taken away, unless they cause some to fall.
- 17<u>For they eat the bread of wickedness, and drink the wine of</u> violence.
- 18<u>But the path of the just</u> is <u>as the shining light, that shineth</u> more and more unto the perfect day.
- 19<u>The way of the wicked is as darkness: they know not at what they stumble.</u>

- 20My son, attend to my words; incline thine ear unto my sayings.
- 21<u>Let them not depart from thine eyes; keep them in the midst of thine heart.</u>
- 22 <u>For they</u> are <u>life unto those that find them, and health to all their flesh.</u>
- 23Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life.
- 24<u>Put away from thee a froward mouth, and perverse lips put</u> far from thee.
- 25Let thine eyes look right on, and let thine eyelids look straight before thee.
- 26Ponder the path of thy feet, and let all thy ways be established.
- 27Turn not to the right hand nor to the left: remove thy foot from evil.

- 1<u>My son, attend unto my wisdom, and bow thine ear to my understanding:</u>
- 2<u>That thou mayest regard discretion, and that thy lips may keep knowledge.</u>
- <u>3For the lips of a strange woman drop as an honeycomb, and her mouth is smoother than oil:</u>
- 4But her end is bitter as wormwood, sharp as a twoedged sword.
- <u>5Her feet go down to death; her steps take hold on hell.</u>
- 6<u>Lest thou shouldest ponder the path of life, her ways are</u> moveable, that thou canst not know them.
- 7<u>Hear me now therefore, O ye children, and depart not from the</u> words of my mouth.
- 8<u>Remove thy way far from her, and come not nigh the door of her house:</u>
- 9<u>Lest thou give thine honour unto others, and thy years unto</u> the cruel:
- 10<u>Lest strangers be filled with thy wealth; and thy labours be in the house of a stranger;</u>

- 11<u>And thou mourn at the last, when thy flesh and thy body are</u> consumed,
- 12<u>And say, How have I hated instruction, and my heart despised reproof;</u>
- 13And have not obeyed the voice of my teachers, nor inclined mine ear to them that instructed me!
- 14<u>I was almost in all evil in the midst of the congregation and assembly.</u>
- 15<u>Drink waters out of thine own cistern, and running waters out of thine own well.</u>
- 16<u>Let thy fountains be dispersed abroad,</u> and <u>rivers of waters in the streets.</u>
- 17<u>Let them be only thine own, and not strangers' with thee.</u>
 18<u>Let thy fountain be blessed: and rejoice with the wife of thy youth.</u>
- 19Let her be as the loving hind and pleasant roe; let her breasts satisfy thee at all times; and be thou ravished always with her love.
- 20<u>And why wilt thou, my son, be ravished with a strange woman, and embrace the bosom of a stranger?</u>
- 21<u>For the ways of man</u> are <u>before the eyes of the LORD, and he pondereth all his goings.</u>
- 22His own iniquities shall take the wicked himself, and he shall be holden with the cords of his sins.
- 23He shall die without instruction; and in the greatness of his folly he shall go astray.

- 1My son, if thou be surety for thy friend, if thou hast stricken thy hand with a stranger,
- 2<u>Thou art snared with the words of thy mouth, thou art taken</u> with the words of thy mouth.
- <u>3Do this now, my son, and deliver thyself, when thou art come</u> into the hand of thy friend; go, humble thyself, and make sure thy friend.
- 4<u>Give not sleep to thine eyes, nor slumber to thine eyelids.</u>
 5<u>Deliver thyself as a roe from the hand of the hunter, and as a bird from the hand of the fowler.</u>

- 6Go to the ant, thou sluggard; consider her ways, and be wise: 7Which having no guide, overseer, or ruler,
- 8<u>Provideth her meat in the summer, and gathereth her food in the harvest.</u>
- 9<u>How long wilt thou sleep, O sluggard? when wilt thou arise out of thy sleep?</u>
- 10Yet<u>a little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands</u> to sleep:
- 11<u>So shall thy poverty come as one that travelleth, and thy want as an armed man.</u>
- 12<u>A naughty person, a wicked man, walketh with a froward</u> mouth.
- 13<u>He winketh with his eyes, he speaketh with his feet, he teacheth with his fingers;</u>
- 14<u>Frowardness</u> is <u>in his heart, he deviseth mischief continually;</u> he soweth discord.
- 15<u>Therefore shall his calamity come suddenly; suddenly shall</u> <u>he be broken without remedy.</u>
- 16<u>These six</u> things <u>doth the LORD hate: yea, seven</u> are <u>an abomination unto him:</u>
- 17<u>A proud look, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood,</u>
- 18<u>An heart that deviseth wicked imaginations, feet that be swift in running to mischief,</u>
- 19<u>A false witness</u> that <u>speaketh lies</u>, and he that soweth discord among brethren.
- 20My son, keep thy father's commandment, and forsake not the law of thy mother:
- 21<u>Bind them continually upon thine heart, and tie them about thy neck.</u>
- 22When thou goest, it shall lead thee; when thou sleepest, it shall keep thee; and when thou awakest, it shall talk with thee.
- 23For the commandment is a lamp; and the law is light; and reproofs of instruction are the way of life:
- 24To keep thee from the evil woman, from the flattery of the tongue of a strange woman.
- 25Lust not after her beauty in thine heart; neither let her take thee with her eyelids.
- 26<u>For by means of a whorish woman</u> a man is brought <u>to a</u> <u>piece of bread: and the adulteress will hunt for the precious life.</u>

- 27<u>Can a man take fire in his bosom, and his clothes not be</u> burned?
- 28<u>Can one go upon hot coals, and his feet not be burned?</u>
 29<u>So he that goeth in to his neighbour's wife; whosoever</u>
 toucheth her shall not be innocent.
- 30Men do not despise a thief, if he steal to satisfy his soul when he is hungry;
- 31<u>But if he be found, he shall restore sevenfold; he shall give all the substance of his house.</u>
- 32But whoso committeth adultery with a woman lacketh understanding: he that doeth it destroyeth his own soul.
- 33A wound and dishonour shall he get; and his reproach shall not be wiped away.
- 34For jealousy is the rage of a man: therefore he will not spare in the day of vengeance.
- 35He will not regard any ransom; neither will he rest content, though thou givest many gifts.

- 1<u>My son, keep my words, and lay up my commandments with</u> thee.
- 2Keep my commandments, and live; and my law as the apple of thine eye.
- 3Bind them upon thy fingers, write them upon the table of thine heart.
- 4<u>Say unto wisdom, Thou</u> art <u>my sister; and call understanding thy kinswoman:</u>
- 5That they may keep thee from the strange woman, from the stranger which flattereth with her words.
- 6For at the window of my house I looked through my casement,
- 7And beheld among the simple ones, I discerned among the youths, a young man void of understanding,
- 8<u>Passing through the street near her corner; and he went the way to her house,</u>
- 9<u>In the twilight, in the evening, in the black and dark night:</u> 10<u>And, behold, there met him a woman</u> with the attire of an harlot, and subtil of heart.
- 11(She is loud and stubborn; her feet abide not in her house:

- 12<u>Now</u> is she <u>without</u>, now in the streets, and lieth in wait at <u>every corner.</u>)
- 13<u>So she caught him, and kissed him,</u> and <u>with an impudent</u> <u>face said unto him,</u>
- 14I have <u>peace offerings with me; this day have I payed my</u> vows.
- 15Therefore came I forth to meet thee, diligently to seek thy face, and I have found thee.
- 16<u>I have decked my bed with coverings of tapestry, with carved works, with fine linen of Egypt.</u>
- 17<u>I have perfumed my bed with myrrh, aloes, and cinnamon.</u>
- 18<u>Come, let us take our fill of love until the morning: let us</u> solace ourselves with loves.
- 19For the goodman is not at home, he is gone a long journey: 20He hath taken a bag of money with him, and will come home at the day appointed.
- 21With her much fair speech she caused him to yield, with the flattering of her lips she forced him.
- 22He goeth after her straightway, as an ox goeth to the slaughter, or as a fool to the correction of the stocks;
- 23<u>Till a dart strike through his liver; as a bird hasteth to the</u> snare, and knoweth not that it is for his life.
- 24Hearken unto me now therefore, O ye children, and attend to the words of my mouth.
- 25<u>Let not thine heart decline to her ways, go not astray in her</u> paths.
- 26<u>For she hath cast down many wounded: yea, many</u> strong men have been slain by her.
- 27<u>Her house</u> is <u>the way to hell, going down to the chambers of death.</u>

- 1<u>Doth not wisdom cry? and understanding put forth her voice?</u>
 2<u>She standeth in the top of high places, by the way in the places of the paths.</u>
- 3She crieth at the gates, at the entry of the city, at the coming in at the doors.
- 4<u>Unto you, O men, I call; and my voice is to the sons of man.</u>

- 50 ye simple, understand wisdom: and, ye fools, be ye of an understanding heart.
- 6<u>Hear; for I will speak of excellent things; and the opening of my lips</u> shall be <u>right things</u>.
- 7For my mouth shall speak truth; and wickedness is an abomination to my lips.
- 8<u>All the words of my mouth are in righteousness;</u> there is <u>nothing froward or perverse in them.</u>
- 9<u>They</u> are <u>all plain to him that understandeth, and right to them that find knowledge.</u>
- 10 <u>Receive my instruction, and not silver; and knowledge rather than choice gold.</u>
- 11For wisdom is better than rubies; and all the things that may be desired are not to be compared to it.
- 12<u>I wisdom dwell with prudence, and find out knowledge of witty inventions.</u>
- 13<u>The fear of the LORD</u> is to hate evil: pride, and arrogancy, and the evil way, and the froward mouth, do I hate.
- 14<u>Counsel</u> is <u>mine</u>, <u>and sound wisdom</u>: I am <u>understanding</u>; I <u>have strength</u>.
- 15By me kings reign, and princes decree justice.
- 16<u>By me princes rule, and nobles, even all the judges of the earth.</u>
- 17<u>I love them that love me; and those that seek me early shall find me.</u>
- 18<u>Riches and honour are with me; yea, durable riches and righteousness.</u>
- 19My fruit is better than gold, yea, than fine gold; and my revenue than choice silver.
- 20<u>I lead in the way of righteousness, in the midst of the paths of judgment:</u>
- 21<u>That I may cause those that love me to inherit substance; and I will fill their treasures.</u>
- 22The LORD possessed me in the beginning of his way, before his works of old.
- 23I was set up from everlasting, from the beginning, or ever the earth was.
- 24<u>When</u> there were <u>no depths, I was brought forth; when</u> there were <u>no fountains abounding with water.</u>

- 25Before the mountains were settled, before the hills was I brought forth:
- 26 While as yet he had not made the earth, nor the fields, nor the highest part of the dust of the world.
- 27When he prepared the heavens, I was there: when he set a compass upon the face of the depth:
- 28When he established the clouds above: when he strengthened the fountains of the deep:
- 29When he gave to the sea his decree, that the waters should not pass his commandment: when he appointed the foundations of the earth:
- 30<u>Then I was by him, as one brought up</u> with him: <u>and I was daily</u> his <u>delight, rejoicing always before him;</u>
- 31<u>Rejoicing in the habitable part of his earth; and my delights</u> were <u>with the sons of men.</u>
- 32Now therefore hearken unto me, O ye children: for blessed are they that keep my ways.
- 33Hear instruction, and be wise, and refuse it not.
- 34<u>Blessed</u> is the man that heareth me, watching daily at my gates, waiting at the posts of my doors.
- 35For whoso findeth me findeth life, and shall obtain favour of the LORD.
- 36<u>But he that sinneth against me wrongeth his own soul: all</u> they that hate me love death.

- 1Wisdom hath builded her house, she hath hewn out her seven pillars: 2She hath killed her beasts; she hath mingled her wine; she hath also furnished her table.
- 3She hath sent forth her maidens: she crieth upon the highest places of the city.
- 4<u>Whoso is simple, let him turn in hither: as for him that wanteth understanding, she saith to him,</u>
- 5Come, eat of my bread, and drink of the wine which I have mingled.
- 6Forsake the foolish, and live; and go in the way of understanding.
- <u>7He that reproveth a scorner getteth to himself shame: and he that rebuketh a wicked</u> man getteth <u>himself a blot.</u>
- 8<u>Reprove not a scorner, lest he hate thee: rebuke a wise man, and he will love thee.</u>

- 9<u>Give</u> instruction to a wise man, and he will be yet wiser: teach a just man, and he will increase in learning.
- 10<u>The fear of the LORD</u> is <u>the beginning of wisdom: and the knowledge of the holy is understanding.</u>
- 11 For by me thy days shall be multiplied, and the years of thy life shall be increased.
- 12<u>If thou be wise, thou shalt be wise for thyself: but if thou scornest, thou alone shalt bear it.</u>
- 13A foolish woman is clamorous: she is simple, and knoweth nothing.
- 14For she sitteth at the door of her house, on a seat in the high places of the city,
- 15To call passengers who go right on their ways:
- 16<u>Whoso</u> is <u>simple, let him turn in hither: and</u> as for <u>him that wanteth</u> <u>understanding, she saith to him,</u>
- 17Stolen waters are sweet, and bread eaten in secret is pleasant.
- 18<u>But he knoweth not that the dead</u> are <u>there;</u> and that <u>her guests</u> are <u>in the depths of hell.</u>

- 1<u>The proverbs of Solomon. A wise son maketh a glad father: but a foolish son is the heaviness of his mother.</u>
- 2Treasures of wickedness profit nothing: but righteousness delivereth from death.
- 3The LORD will not suffer the soul of the righteous to famish: but he casteth away the substance of the wicked.
- 4<u>He becometh poor that dealeth</u> with a slack hand: but the hand of the diligent maketh rich.
- <u>5He that gathereth in summer is a wise son:</u> but <u>he that sleepeth in harvest is a son that causeth shame.</u>
- 6Blessings are upon the head of the just: but violence covereth the mouth of the wicked.
- 7<u>The memory of the just</u> is <u>blessed</u>: but the name of the wicked shall rot.
- 8<u>The wise in heart will receive commandments: but a prating fool shall fall.</u>

- 10He that winketh with the eye causeth sorrow: but a prating fool shall fall.
- 11<u>The mouth of a righteous</u> man is a well of life: but violence covereth the mouth of the wicked.
- 12 Hatred stirreth up strifes: but love covereth all sins.

- 13In the lips of him that hath understanding wisdom is found: but a rod is for the back of him that is void of understanding.
- 14Wise men lay up knowledge: but the mouth of the foolish is near destruction.
- 15The rich man's wealth is his strong city: the destruction of the poor is their poverty.
- 16<u>The labour of the righteous</u> tendeth to life: the fruit of the wicked to sin.
- 17<u>He</u> is in the way of life that keepeth instruction: but he that refuseth reproof erreth.
- 18<u>He that hideth hatred with lying lips, and he that uttereth a slander, is a</u> fool.
- 19<u>In the multitude of words there wanteth not sin: but he that refraineth his lips is wise.</u>
- 20<u>The tongue of the just</u> is as <u>choice silver</u>: the heart of the wicked is <u>little</u> worth.
- 21<u>The lips of the righteous feed many: but fools die for want of wisdom.</u>
- 22<u>The blessing of the LORD, it maketh rich, and he addeth no sorrow with</u> it.
- 23It is as sport to a fool to do mischief: but a man of understanding hath wisdom.
- 24The fear of the wicked, it shall come upon him: but the desire of the righteous shall be granted.
- 25As the whirlwind passeth, so is the wicked no more: but the righteous is an everlasting foundation.
- 26<u>As vinegar to the teeth, and as smoke to the eyes, so is the sluggard to</u> them that send him.
- 27<u>The fear of the LORD prolongeth days: but the years of the wicked shall</u> be shortened.
- 28<u>The hope of the righteous</u> shall be <u>gladness</u>: but the expectation of the <u>wicked shall perish</u>.
- 29<u>The way of the LORD</u> is strength to the upright: but destruction shall be to the workers of iniquity.
- 30<u>The righteous shall never be removed: but the wicked shall not inhabit</u> the earth.
- 31<u>The mouth of the just bringeth forth wisdom: but the froward tongue shall be cut out.</u>
- 32<u>The lips of the righteous know what is acceptable: but the mouth of the wicked speaketh frowardness.</u>

- 1A false balance is abomination to the LORD: but a just weight is his delight.
- 2When <u>pride cometh, then cometh shame: but with the lowly is wisdom.</u>
- 3The integrity of the upright shall guide them: but the perverseness of transgressors shall destroy them.
- 4<u>Riches profit not in the day of wrath: but righteousness delivereth from death.</u>
- 5The righteousness of the perfect shall direct his way: but the wicked shall fall by his own wickedness.
- 6<u>The righteousness of the upright shall deliver them: but transgressors shall be taken in their own naughtiness.</u>
- 7When a wicked man dieth, his expectation shall perish: and the hope of unjust men perisheth.
- 8The righteous is delivered out of trouble, and the wicked cometh in his stead.
- 9<u>An hypocrite with his mouth destroyeth his neighbour: but through knowledge shall the just be delivered.</u>
- 10When it goeth well with the righteous, the city rejoiceth: and when the wicked perish, there is shouting.
- 11By the blessing of the upright the city is exalted: but it is overthrown by the mouth of the wicked.
- 12<u>He that is void of wisdom despiseth his neighbour: but a man of understanding holdeth his peace.</u>
- 13A talebearer revealeth secrets: but he that is of a faithful spirit concealeth the matter.
- 14Where no counsel is, the people fall: but in the multitude of counsellors there is safety.
- 15<u>He that is surety for a stranger shall smart</u> for it<u>: and he that hateth suretiship is sure.</u>
- 16<u>A gracious woman retaineth honour: and strong men retain riches.</u>
- 17<u>The merciful man doeth good to his own soul: but</u> he that is cruel troubleth his own flesh.
- 18<u>The wicked worketh a deceitful work: but to him that soweth righteousness</u> shall be <u>a sure reward.</u>

19<u>As righteousness</u> tendeth <u>to life: so he that pursueth evil pursueth it to his own death.</u>

20They that are of a froward heart are abomination to the LORD: but such as are upright in their way are his delight.
21Though hand join in hand, the wicked shall not be unpunished: but the seed of the righteous shall be delivered.
22As a jewel of gold in a swine's snout, so is a fair woman which is without discretion.

- 23The desire of the righteous is only good: but the expectation of the wicked is wrath.
- 24<u>There is that scattereth, and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty.</u>
- 25The liberal soul shall be made fat: and he that watereth shall be watered also himself.
- 26<u>He that withholdeth corn, the people shall curse him: but blessing shall be upon the head of him that selleth it.</u>
- 27<u>He that diligently seeketh good procureth favour: but he that seeketh mischief, it shall come unto him.</u>
- 28<u>He that trusteth in his riches shall fall: but the righteous shall flourish as a branch.</u>
- 29He that troubleth his own house shall inherit the wind: and the fool shall be servant to the wise of heart.
- 30The fruit of the righteous is a tree of life; and he that winneth souls is wise.
- 31<u>Behold, the righteous shall be recompensed in the earth:</u> much more the wicked and the sinner.

- 1<u>Whoso loveth instruction loveth knowledge: but he that hateth reproof</u> is <u>brutish.</u>
- 2<u>A good man obtaineth favour of the LORD: but a man of wicked devices will he condemn.</u>
- <u>3A man shall not be established by wickedness: but the root of the righteous shall not be moved.</u>
- 4<u>A virtuous woman</u> is <u>a crown to her husband: but she that</u> <u>maketh ashamed</u> is <u>as rottenness in his bones.</u>

- 14<u>A man shall be satisfied with good by the fruit of</u> his <u>mouth:</u> and the recompence of a man's hands shall be rendered unto him.
- 15The way of a fool is right in his own eyes: but he that hearkeneth unto counsel is wise.
- 16<u>A fool's wrath is presently known: but a</u> prudent man covereth shame.
- 17He that <u>speaketh truth sheweth forth righteousness: but a</u> false witness deceit.
- 18<u>There is that speaketh like the piercings of a sword: but the tongue of the wise is health.</u>
- 19<u>The lip of truth shall be established for ever: but a lying tongue is but for a moment.</u>
- 20Deceit is in the heart of them that imagine evil: but to the counsellors of peace is joy.
- 21There shall no evil happen to the just: but the wicked shall be filled with mischief.
- 22<u>Lying lips</u> are <u>abomination to the LORD: but they that deal</u> <u>truly</u> are <u>his delight.</u>
- 23<u>A prudent man concealeth knowledge: but the heart of fools proclaimeth foolishness.</u>
- 24<u>The hand of the diligent shall bear rule: but the slothful shall be under tribute.</u>

- 25Heaviness in the heart of man maketh it stoop: but a good word maketh it glad.
- 26<u>The righteous</u> is <u>more excellent than his neighbour: but the</u> <u>way of the wicked seduceth them.</u>
- 27<u>The slothful man roasteth not that which he took in hunting:</u> but the substance of a diligent man is precious.
- 28<u>In the way of righteousness is life; and in the pathway</u> thereof there is <u>no death.</u>

- 1<u>A wise son</u> heareth <u>his father's instruction: but a scorner heareth not</u> rebuke.
- 2A man shall eat good by the fruit of his mouth: but the soul of the transgressors shall eat violence.
- 3He that keepeth his mouth keepeth his life: but he that openeth wide his lips shall have destruction.
- 4<u>The soul of the sluggard desireth, and</u> hath <u>nothing: but the soul of the diligent shall be made fat.</u>
- <u>5A righteous</u> man <u>hateth lying: but a wicked</u> man <u>is loathsome, and cometh to shame.</u>

- 12<u>Hope deferred maketh the heart sick: but</u> when <u>the desire cometh,</u> it is <u>a</u> <u>tree of life.</u>
- 13Whoso despiseth the word shall be destroyed: but he that feareth the commandment shall be rewarded.
- 14<u>The law of the wise is a fountain of life, to depart from the snares of death.</u>
- 15Good understanding giveth favour: but the way of transgressors is hard.
- 16<u>Every prudent</u> man <u>dealeth with knowledge: but a fool layeth</u> <u>open</u> his <u>folly.</u>

- 17<u>A wicked messenger falleth into mischief: but a faithful</u> ambassador is health.
- 18<u>Poverty and shame</u> shall be to <u>him that refuseth instruction: but he that regardeth reproof shall be honoured.</u>
- 19<u>The desire accomplished is sweet to the soul: but it is abomination to fools to depart from evil.</u>
- 20<u>He that walketh with wise</u> men<u>shall be wise: but a companion of fools shall be destroyed.</u>
- 21 Evil pursueth sinners: but to the righteous good shall be repayed.
- 22<u>A good man leaveth an inheritance to his children's children: and the wealth of the sinner is laid up for the just.</u>
- 23<u>Much food</u> is in the tillage of the poor: but there is that is destroyed for want of judgment.
- 24<u>He that spareth his rod hateth his son: but he that loveth him chasteneth</u> him betimes.
- 25The righteous eateth to the satisfying of his soul: but the belly of the wicked shall want.

- 1<u>Every wise woman buildeth her house: but the foolish plucketh it down with her hands.</u>
- 2He that walketh in his uprightness feareth the LORD: but he that is perverse in his ways despiseth him.
- <u>3In the mouth of the foolish</u> is <u>a rod of pride: but the lips of the</u> <u>wise shall preserve them.</u>
- 4<u>Where no oxen are, the crib</u> is <u>clean: but much increase</u> is <u>by</u> <u>the strength of the ox.</u>
- 5A faithful witness will not lie: but a false witness will utter lies.
- 6A scorner seeketh wisdom, and findeth it not: but
- knowledge is easy unto him that understandeth.
- 7Go from the presence of a foolish man, when thou perceivest not in him the lips of knowledge.
- 8<u>The wisdom of the prudent is to understand his way: but the folly of fools is deceit.</u>
- 9<u>Fools make a mock at sin: but among the righteous</u> there is <u>favour</u>.
- 10<u>The heart knoweth his own bitterness; and a stranger doth</u> not intermeddle with his joy.
- 11The house of the wicked shall be overthrown: but the tabernacle of the upright shall flourish.

- 12<u>There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end</u> thereof are the ways of death.
- 13<u>Even in laughter the heart is sorrowful; and the end of that mirth</u> is <u>heaviness</u>.
- 14<u>The backslider in heart shall be filled with his own ways: and a good man</u> shall be satisfied <u>from himself.</u>
- 15The simple believeth every word: but the
- prudent man looketh well to his going.
- 16<u>A wise</u> man <u>feareth</u>, <u>and departeth from evil: but the fool rageth, and is confident.</u>
- 17He that is <u>soon angry dealeth foolishly: and a man of wicked</u> <u>devices is hated.</u>
- 18<u>The simple inherit folly: but the prudent are crowned with knowledge.</u>
- 19<u>The evil bow before the good; and the wicked at the gates of the righteous.</u>
- 20<u>The poor is hated even of his own neighbour: but the rich hath many friends.</u>
- 21<u>He that despiseth his neighbour sinneth: but he that hath mercy on the poor, happy is he.</u>
- 22<u>Do they not err that devise evil? but mercy and truth shall</u> be to them that devise good.
- 23In all labour there is profit: but the talk of the lips tendeth only to penury.

- 1A soft answer turneth away wrath: but grievous words stir up anger.
- 2The tongue of the wise useth knowledge aright: but the mouth of fools poureth out foolishness.

- 4A wholesome tongue is a tree of life: but perverseness therein is a breach in the spirit.
- 5A fool despiseth his father's instruction: but he that regardeth reproof is prudent.

- 23A man hath joy by the answer of his mouth: and a word spoken in due season, how good is it!
- 24<u>The way of life is above to the wise, that he may depart from hell beneath.</u>
- 25<u>The LORD will destroy the house of the proud: but he will establish the border of the widow.</u>
- 26<u>The thoughts of the wicked are an abomination to the LORD:</u> but the words of the pure are pleasant words.
- 27He that is greedy of gain troubleth his own house; but he that hateth gifts shall live.
- 28The heart of the righteous studieth to answer: but the mouth of the wicked poureth out evil things.
- 29<u>The LORD</u> is far from the wicked: but he heareth the prayer of the righteous.
- 30<u>The light of the eyes rejoiceth the heart: and a good report maketh the bones fat.</u>
- 31<u>The ear that heareth the reproof of life abideth among the</u> wise.
- 32He that refuseth instruction despiseth his own soul: but he that heareth reproof getteth understanding.
- 33The fear of the LORD is the instruction of wisdom; and before honour is humility.

- 1<u>The preparations of the heart in man, and the answer of the tongue, is from the LORD.</u>
- 2<u>All the ways of a man</u> are <u>clean in his own eyes; but the LORD</u> <u>weigheth the spirits.</u>
- <u>3Commit thy works unto the LORD, and thy thoughts shall be</u> established.
- 4<u>The LORD hath made all</u> things for himself: yea, even the wicked for the day of evil.
- <u>5Every one</u> that is <u>proud in heart</u> is <u>an abomination to the</u> LORD: though hand join in hand, he shall not be unpunished.
- 6By mercy and truth iniquity is purged: and by the fear of the LORD men depart from evil.
- 7When a man's ways please the LORD, he maketh even his enemies to be at peace with him.
- 8<u>Better</u> is a <u>little with righteousness than great revenues</u> without right.
- 9<u>A man's heart deviseth his way: but the LORD directeth his steps.</u>
- 10<u>A divine sentence is in the lips of the king: his mouth transgresseth not in judgment.</u>
- 11<u>A just weight and balance are the LORD'S: all the weights of the bag</u> are <u>his work.</u>
- 12It is an abomination to kings to commit wickedness: for the throne is established by righteousness.
- 13<u>Righteous lips</u> are <u>the delight of kings; and they love him that speaketh right.</u>
- 14<u>The wrath of a king</u> is as <u>messengers of death: but a wise man</u> will pacify it.
- 15In the light of the king's countenance is life; and his favour is as a cloud of the latter rain.
- 16<u>How much better</u> is it <u>to get wisdom than gold! and to get understanding rather to be chosen than silver!</u>
- 17The highway of the upright is to depart from evil: he that keepeth his way preserveth his soul.
- 18<u>Pride</u> goeth <u>before destruction</u>, and an haughty spirit before <u>a fall</u>.

- 19<u>Better</u> it is to be <u>of an humble spirit with the lowly, than to divide the spoil with the proud.</u>
- 20<u>He that handleth a matter wisely shall find good: and whoso trusteth in the LORD, happy is he.</u>
- 21<u>The wise in heart shall be called prudent: and the sweetness of the lips increaseth learning.</u>
- 22<u>Understanding</u> is <u>a wellspring of life unto him that hath it:</u> <u>but the instruction of fools</u> is <u>folly.</u>
- 23<u>The heart of the wise teacheth his mouth, and addeth learning to his lips.</u>
- 24<u>Pleasant words</u> are as <u>an honeycomb</u>, <u>sweet to the soul, and</u> health to the bones.

- 28A froward man soweth strife: and a whisperer separateth chief friends.
- 29A violent man enticeth his neighbour, and leadeth him into the way that is not good.
- 30He shutteth his eyes to devise froward things: moving his lips he bringeth evil to pass.
- 31The hoary head is a crown of glory, if it be found in the way of righteousness.
- 32He that is <u>slow to anger</u> is <u>better than the mighty; and he that</u> ruleth his spirit than he that taketh a city.
- 33<u>The lot is cast into the lap; but the whole disposing</u> thereof is of the LORD.

- 1<u>Better is a dry morsel, and quietness therewith, than an house full of sacrifices with strife.</u>
- 2A wise servant shall have rule over a son that causeth shame, and shall have part of the inheritance among the brethren.

 3The fining pot is for silver, and the furnace for gold: but the LORD trieth the hearts.

- 4A wicked doer giveth heed to false lips; and a liar giveth ear to a naughty tongue.
- <u>5Whoso mocketh the poor reproacheth his Maker:</u> and <u>he that is glad at calamities shall not be unpunished.</u>
- 6<u>Children's children</u> are the crown of old men; and the glory of children are their fathers.
- 7Excellent speech becometh not a fool: much less do lying lips a prince.
- 8<u>A gift</u> is as a precious stone in the eyes of him that hath it: whithersoever it turneth, it prospereth.
- 9He that covereth a transgression seeketh love; but he that repeateth a matter separateth very friends.
- 10<u>A reproof entereth more into a wise man than an hundred stripes into a fool.</u>
- 11<u>An evil man seeketh only rebellion: therefore a cruel messenger shall be sent against him.</u>
- 12<u>Let a bear robbed of her whelps meet a man, rather than a fool</u> in his folly.
- 13Whoso rewardeth evil for good, evil shall not depart from his house.
- 14<u>The beginning of strife</u> is as when one letteth out water: therefore leave off contention, before it be meddled with.
- 15He that justifieth the wicked, and he that condemneth the just, even they both are abomination to the LORD.
- 16Wherefore is there a price in the hand of a fool to get wisdom, seeing he hath no heart to it?
- 17A friend loveth at all times, and a brother is born for adversity.
- 18<u>A man void of understanding striketh hands,</u> and <u>becometh</u> surety in the presence of his friend.
- 19<u>He loveth transgression that loveth strife:</u> and <u>he that exalteth his gate seeketh destruction.</u>
- 20He that hath a froward heart findeth no good: and he that hath a perverse tongue falleth into mischief.
- 21<u>He that begetteth a fool</u> doeth it to his sorrow: and the father of a fool hath no joy.
- 22<u>A merry heart doeth good</u> like <u>a medicine: but a broken spirit drieth the bones.</u>
- 23A wicked man taketh a gift out of the bosom to pervert the ways of judgment.

- 24Wisdom is before him that hath understanding; but the eyes of a fool are in the ends of the earth.
- 25A foolish son is a grief to his father, and bitterness to her that bare him.
- 26<u>Also to punish the just is not good, nor to strike princes for equity.</u>
- 27He that hath knowledge spareth his words: and a man of understanding is of an excellent spirit.
- 28Even a fool, when he holdeth his peace, is counted wise: and he that shutteth his lips is esteemed a man of understanding.

- 1Through desire a man, having separated himself, seeketh and intermeddleth with all wisdom.
- 2A fool hath no delight in understanding, but that his heart may discover itself.
- 3When the wicked cometh, then cometh also contempt, and with ignominy reproach.
- 4The words of a man's mouth are as deep waters, and the wellspring of wisdom as a flowing brook.
- 5It is not good to accept the person of the wicked, to overthrow the righteous in judgment.
- 6A fool's lips enter into contention, and his mouth calleth for strokes.
- 7A fool's mouth is his destruction, and his lips are the snare of his soul.
- 8The words of a talebearer are as wounds, and they go down into the innermost parts of the belly.
- <u>9He also that is slothful in his work is brother to him that is a</u> great waster.
- <u>10The name of the LORD is a strong tower: the righteous runneth into it, and is safe.</u>
- 11The rich man's wealth is his strong city, and as an high wall in his own conceit.
- <u>12Before destruction the heart of man is haughty, and before</u> <u>honour is humility.</u>

- 13He that answereth a matter before he heareth it, it is folly and shame unto him.
- 14The spirit of a man will sustain his infirmity; but a wounded spirit who can bear?
- 15The heart of the prudent getteth knowledge; and the ear of the wise seeketh knowledge.
- 16A man's gift maketh room for him, and bringeth him before great men.
- 17He that is first in his own cause seemeth just; but his neighbour cometh and searcheth him.
- 18The lot causeth contentions to cease, and parteth between the mighty.
- 19A brother offended is harder to be won than a strong city: and their contentions are like the bars of a castle.
- 20A man's belly shall be satisfied with the fruit of his
- mouth; and with the increase of his lips shall he be filled.
- 21Death and life are in the power of the tongue: and they that love it shall eat the fruit thereof.
- <u>22Whoso findeth a wife findeth a good thing, and obtaineth</u> <u>favour of the LORD.</u>
- 23The poor useth intreaties; but the rich answereth roughly. 24A man that hath friends must shew himself friendly: and there is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother.

- 1<u>Better</u> is <u>the poor that walketh in his integrity, than</u> he that is <u>perverse in his lips, and is a fool.</u>
- <u>2Also,</u> that <u>the soul</u> be <u>without knowledge</u>, it is <u>not good</u>; and he <u>that hasteth with</u> his <u>feet sinneth</u>.
- <u>3The foolishness of man perverteth his way: and his heart fretteth against the LORD.</u>
- 4Wealth maketh many friends; but the poor is separated from his neighbour.
- <u>5A false witness shall not be unpunished, and he that speaketh lies shall not escape.</u>
- 6<u>Many will intreat the favour of the prince: and every man</u> is <u>a</u> <u>friend to him that giveth gifts.</u>

- 7All the brethren of the poor do hate him: how much more do his friends go far from him? he pursueth them with words, yet they are wanting to him.
- 8<u>He that getteth wisdom loveth his own soul: he that keepeth understanding shall find good.</u>
- 9A false witness shall not be unpunished, and he that speaketh lies shall perish.
- 10<u>Delight is not seemly for a fool; much less for a servant to have rule over princes.</u>
- 11<u>The discretion of a man deferreth his anger; and it is his glory to pass over a transgression.</u>
- 12<u>The king's wrath</u> is <u>as the roaring of a lion; but his</u> <u>favour is as dew upon the grass.</u>
- 13<u>A foolish son</u> is the calamity of his father: and the contentions of a wife are a continual dropping.
- 14<u>House and riches</u> are <u>the inheritance of fathers: and a prudent wife</u> is <u>from the LORD.</u>
- 15<u>Slothfulness casteth into a deep sleep; and an idle soul shall suffer hunger.</u>
- 16<u>He that keepeth the commandment keepeth his own soul;</u> but <u>he that despiseth his ways shall die.</u>
- 17<u>He that hath pity upon the poor lendeth unto the LORD; and that which he hath given will he pay him again.</u>
- 18<u>Chasten thy son while there is hope, and let not thy soul spare</u> for his crying.
- 19<u>A man of great wrath shall suffer punishment: for if thou deliver him, yet thou must do it again.</u>
- 20<u>Hear counsel, and receive instruction, that thou mayest be wise in thy latter end.</u>
- 21There are <u>many devices in a man's heart; nevertheless the</u> <u>counsel of the LORD, that shall stand.</u>
- 22<u>The desire of a man is his kindness: and a poor man is better</u> than a liar.
- 23<u>The fear of the LORD</u> tendeth <u>to life: and</u> he that hath it <u>shall</u> <u>abide satisfied; he shall not be visited with evil.</u>
- 24<u>A slothful man hideth his hand in his bosom, and will not so much as bring it to his mouth again.</u>
- 25Smite a scorner, and the simple will beware: and reprove one that hath understanding, and he will understand knowledge.

- 26<u>He that wasteth</u> his <u>father</u>, and <u>chaseth away</u> his <u>mother</u>, is a <u>son that causeth shame</u>, and <u>bringeth reproach</u>.
- 27<u>Cease, my son, to hear the instruction</u> that causeth <u>to err</u> <u>from the words of knowledge.</u>
- 28<u>An ungodly witness scorneth judgment: and the mouth of the wicked devoureth iniquity.</u>
- 29Judgments are prepared for scorners, and stripes for the back of fools.

- 1Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging: and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise.
- <u>2The fear of a king is as the roaring of a lion:</u> whoso <u>provoketh</u> <u>him to anger sinneth</u> against <u>his own soul.</u>
- 3It is an honour for a man to cease from strife: but every fool will be meddling.
- 4The sluggard will not plow by reason of the
- <u>cold;</u> therefore <u>shall he beg in harvest, and have nothing.</u>
- <u>5Counsel in the heart of man</u> is like <u>deep water; but a man of</u> <u>understanding will draw it out.</u>
- 6<u>Most men will proclaim every one his own goodness: but a faithful man who can find?</u>
- 7<u>The just man walketh in his integrity: his children are blessed after him.</u>
- 8A king that sitteth in the throne of judgment scattereth away all evil with his eyes.
- 9Who can say, I have made my heart clean, I am pure from my sin?
- 10<u>Divers weights,</u> and <u>divers measures, both of them</u> are <u>alike</u> <u>abomination to the LORD.</u>
- 11Even a child is known by his doings, whether his work be pure, and whether it be right.
- 12<u>The hearing ear, and the seeing eye, the LORD hath made even both of them.</u>
- 13Love not sleep, lest thou come to poverty; open thine eyes, and thou shalt be satisfied with bread.

- 14It is <u>naught</u>, it is <u>naught</u>, saith the buyer: but when he is gone <u>his way</u>, then he boasteth.
- 15<u>There is gold, and a multitude of rubies: but the lips of knowledge</u> are <u>a precious jewel.</u>
- 16<u>Take his garment that is surety for a stranger: and take a pledge of him for a strange woman.</u>
- 17<u>Bread of deceit is sweet to a man; but afterwards his mouth shall be filled with gravel.</u>
- 18Every <u>purpose</u> is established by counsel: and with good advice make war.
- 19<u>He that goeth about as a talebearer revealeth secrets:</u>
- therefore meddle not with him that flattereth with his lips.
- 20 Whoso curseth his father or his mother, his lamp shall be put out in obscure darkness.
- 21<u>An inheritance</u> may be <u>gotten hastily at the beginning; but</u> <u>the end thereof shall not be blessed.</u>
- 22<u>Say not thou, I will recompense evil;</u> but <u>wait on the LORD,</u> and he shall save thee.
- 23<u>Divers weights are an abomination unto the LORD; and a false balance is not good.</u>
- 24<u>Man's goings</u> are <u>of the LORD; how can a man then understand his own way?</u>
- 25It is a snare to the man who devoureth that which is holy, and after vows to make enquiry.
- 26<u>A wise king scattereth the wicked, and bringeth the wheel</u> over them.
- 27The spirit of man is the candle of the LORD, searching all the inward parts of the belly.
- 28Mercy and truth preserve the king: and his throne is upholden by mercy.
- 29The glory of young men is their strength: and the beauty of old men is the gray head.
- 30<u>The blueness of a wound cleanseth away evil: so do stripes the inward parts of the belly.</u>

1<u>The king's heart</u> is <u>in the hand of the LORD</u>, as <u>the rivers of</u> water: he turneth it whithersoever he will.

- <u>2Every way of a man</u> is <u>right in his own eyes: but the LORD</u> <u>pondereth the hearts.</u>
- <u>3To do justice and judgment is more acceptable to the LORD than sacrifice.</u>
- 4An high look, and a proud heart, and the plowing of the wicked, is sin.
- <u>5The thoughts of the diligent</u> tend <u>only to plenteousness; but of every one</u> that is <u>hasty only to want.</u>
- 6<u>The getting of treasures by a lying tongue</u> is <u>a vanity tossed to</u> and fro of them that seek death.
- 7The robbery of the wicked shall destroy them; because they refuse to do judgment.
- 8<u>The way of man</u> is <u>froward and strange: but</u> as for <u>the pure</u>, <u>his work</u> is <u>right</u>.
- 9It is <u>better to dwell in a corner of the housetop, than with a brawling woman in a wide house.</u>
- 10The soul of the wicked desireth evil: his neighbour findeth no favour in his eyes.
- 11When the scorner is punished, the simple is made wise: and when the wise is instructed, he receiveth knowledge.
- 12<u>The righteous</u> man <u>wisely considereth the house of the</u> <u>wicked:</u> but God <u>overthroweth the wicked for</u> their <u>wickedness</u>.
- 13Whoso stoppeth his ears at the cry of the poor, he also shall cry himself, but shall not be heard.
- 14<u>A gift in secret pacifieth anger: and a reward in the bosom strong wrath.</u>
- 15It is joy to the just to do judgment: but destruction shall be to the workers of iniquity.
- 16<u>The man that wandereth out of the way of understanding</u> shall remain in the congregation of the dead.
- 17<u>He that loveth pleasure</u> shall be <u>a poor man: he that loveth</u> wine and oil shall not be rich.
- 18<u>The wicked</u> shall be <u>a ransom for the righteous, and the transgressor for the upright.</u>
- 19It is <u>better to dwell in the wilderness, than with a contentious</u> and an angry woman.
- 20There is <u>treasure to be desired and oil in the dwelling of the wise; but a foolish man spendeth it up.</u>
- 21<u>He that followeth after righteousness and mercy findeth life, righteousness, and honour.</u>

- 22<u>A wise man scaleth the city of the mighty, and casteth down the strength of the confidence thereof.</u>
- 23Whoso keepeth his mouth and his tongue keepeth his soul from troubles.
- 24<u>Proud</u> and <u>haughty scorner</u> is <u>his name</u>, <u>who dealeth in proud wrath</u>.
- 25The desire of the slothful killeth him; for his hands refuse to labour.
- 26<u>He coveteth greedily all the day long: but the righteous giveth and spareth not.</u>
- 27The sacrifice of the wicked is abomination: how much more, when he bringeth it with a wicked mind?
- 28<u>A false witness shall perish: but the man that heareth speaketh constantly.</u>
- 29<u>A wicked man hardeneth his face: but as for the upright, he directeth his way.</u>
- 30There is <u>no wisdom nor understanding nor counsel against</u> the LORD.
- 31<u>The horse is prepared against the day of battle: but safety is of the LORD.</u>

- 1A good <u>name</u> is <u>rather to be chosen than great</u> <u>riches</u>, and <u>loving favour rather than silver and gold</u>.

 2The rich and poor meet together: the LORD is the maker of them all.
- 3A prudent man foreseeth the evil, and hideth himself: but the simple pass on, and are punished.
- 4By humility and the fear of the LORD are riches, and honour, and life.
- <u>5Thorns</u> and <u>snares</u> are <u>in the way of the froward: he that doth</u> <u>keep his soul shall be far from them.</u>
- 6<u>Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it.</u>
- 7<u>The rich ruleth over the poor, and the borrower is servant to the lender.</u>
- 8<u>He that soweth iniquity shall reap vanity: and the rod of his anger shall fail.</u>

- 9He that hath a bountiful eye shall be blessed; for he giveth of his bread to the poor.
- 10<u>Cast out the scorner, and contention shall go out; yea, strife</u> and reproach shall cease.
- 11<u>He that loveth pureness of heart, for the grace of his lips the king</u> shall be <u>his friend.</u>
- 12<u>The eyes of the LORD preserve knowledge, and he overthroweth the words of the transgressor.</u>
- 13<u>The slothful</u> man <u>saith</u>, There is <u>a lion without</u>, <u>I shall be slain</u> <u>in the streets</u>.
- 14<u>The mouth of strange women is a deep pit: he that is abhorred of the LORD shall fall therein.</u>
- 15Foolishness is bound in the heart of a child; but the rod of correction shall drive it far from him.
- 16<u>He that oppresseth the poor to increase his</u> riches, and <u>he that giveth to the rich,</u> shall <u>surely</u> come <u>to want.</u>
- 17Bow down thine ear, and hear the words of the wise, and apply thine heart unto my knowledge.
- 18<u>For</u> it is a pleasant thing if thou keep them within thee; they shall withal be fitted in thy lips.
- 19<u>That thy trust may be in the LORD, I have made known to thee this day, even to thee.</u>
- 20Have not I written to thee excellent things in counsels and knowledge,
- 21<u>That I might make thee know the certainty of the words of truth; that thou mightest answer the words of truth to them that send unto thee?</u>
- 22<u>Rob not the poor, because he</u> is <u>poor: neither oppress the</u> <u>afflicted in the gate:</u>
- 23For the LORD will plead their cause, and spoil the soul of those that spoiled them.
- 24Make no friendship with an angry man; and with a furious man thou shalt not go:
- 25<u>Lest thou learn his ways, and get a snare to thy soul.</u>
- 26<u>Be not thou</u> one <u>of them that strike hands,</u> or <u>of them that are sureties for debts.</u>
- 27<u>If thou hast nothing to pay, why should he take away thy bed</u> <u>from under thee?</u>
- 28Remove not the ancient landmark, which thy fathers have set.

29Seest thou a man diligent in his business? he shall stand before kings; he shall not stand before mean men.

- 1When thou sittest to eat with a ruler, consider diligently what is before thee:
- 2And put a knife to thy throat, if thou be a man given to appetite.
- 3Be not desirous of his dainties: for they are deceitful meat.
- 4<u>Labour not to be rich: cease from thine own wisdom.</u>
- <u>5Wilt thou set thine eyes upon that which is not?</u>
- for riches certainly make themselves wings; they fly away as an eagle toward heaven.
- 6<u>Eat thou not the bread of</u> him that hath <u>an evil eye, neither</u> <u>desire thou his dainty meats:</u>
- 7For as he thinketh in his heart, so is he: Eat and drink, saith he to thee; but his heart is not with thee.
- 8<u>The morsel</u> which thou hast eaten shalt thou vomit up, and lose thy sweet words.
- 9Speak not in the ears of a fool: for he will despise the wisdom of thy words.
- 10 Remove not the old landmark; and enter not into the fields of the fatherless:
- 11For their redeemer is mighty; he shall plead their cause with thee.
- 12Apply thine heart unto instruction, and thine ears to the words of knowledge.
- 13Withhold not correction from the child: for if thou beatest him with the rod, he shall not die.
- 14<u>Thou shalt beat him with the rod, and shalt deliver his soul</u> from hell.
- 15My son, if thine heart be wise, my heart shall rejoice, even mine.
- 16<u>Yea, my reins shall rejoice, when thy lips speak right things.</u> 17<u>Let not thine heart envy sinners: but</u> be thou <u>in the fear of the LORD all the day long.</u>
- 18 For surely there is an end; and thine expectation shall not be cut off.

- 19<u>Hear thou, my son, and be wise, and guide thine heart in the way.</u>
- 20<u>Be not among winebibbers; among riotous eaters of flesh:</u>
 21<u>For the drunkard and the glutton shall come to poverty: and</u>
 drowsiness shall clothe a man with rags.
- 22<u>Hearken unto thy father that begat thee, and despise not thy</u> mother when she is old.
- 23Buy the truth, and sell it not; also wisdom, and instruction, and understanding.
- 24The father of the righteous shall greatly rejoice: and he that begetteth a wise child shall have joy of him.
- 25Thy father and thy mother shall be glad, and she that bare thee shall rejoice.
- 26My son, give me thine heart, and let thine eyes observe my ways.
- 27 For a whore is a deep ditch; and a strange woman is a narrow pit.
- 28<u>She also lieth in wait as for a prey, and increaseth the transgressors among men.</u>
- 29Who hath woe? who hath sorrow? who hath contentions? who hath babbling? who hath wounds without cause? who hath redness of eyes?
- 30<u>They that tarry long at the wine; they that go to seek mixed wine.</u>
- 31<u>Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his colour in the cup, when it moveth itself aright.</u>
- 32At the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder.
- 33<u>Thine eyes shall behold strange women, and thine heart shall</u> <u>utter perverse things.</u>
- 34Yea, thou shalt be as he that lieth down in the midst of the sea, or as he that lieth upon the top of a mast.
- 35<u>They have stricken me, shalt thou say, and I was not sick;</u> they have beaten me, and I felt it not: when shall I awake? I will seek it yet again.

- 1<u>Be not thou envious against evil men, neither desire to be with</u> them.
- 2For their heart studieth destruction, and their lips talk of mischief.
- 3Through wisdom is an house builded; and by understanding it is established:
- 4And by knowledge shall the chambers be filled with all precious and pleasant riches.
- <u>5A wise man</u> is <u>strong; yea, a man of knowledge increaseth</u> <u>strength.</u>
- 6For by wise counsel thou shalt make thy war: and in multitude of counsellors there is safety.
- 7<u>Wisdom</u> is <u>too high for a fool: he openeth not his mouth in the gate.</u>
- 8<u>He that deviseth to do evil shall be called a mischievous person.</u>
- 9<u>The thought of foolishness</u> is <u>sin: and the scorner</u> is <u>an</u> abomination to men.
- 10If thou faint in the day of adversity, thy strength is small.

 11If thou forbear to deliver them that are drawn unto death, and those that are ready to be slain;
- 12<u>If thou sayest, Behold, we knew it not; doth not he that</u>
 pondereth the heart consider it? and he that keepeth thy soul,
 doth not he know it? and shall not he render to every man
 according to his works?
- 13My son, eat thou honey, because it is good; and the honeycomb, which is sweet to thy taste:
- 14<u>So</u> shall the knowledge of wisdom be unto thy soul: when thou hast found it, then there shall be a reward, and thy expectation shall not be cut off.
- 15<u>Lay not wait, O wicked man, against the dwelling of the righteous; spoil not his resting place:</u>
- 16For a just man falleth seven times, and riseth up again: but the wicked shall fall into mischief.
- 17<u>Rejoice not when thine enemy falleth, and let not thine heart be glad when he stumbleth:</u>

- 18<u>Lest the LORD see</u> it, and it displease him, and he turn away his wrath from him.
- 19<u>Fret not thyself because of evil men, neither be thou envious at the wicked;</u>
- 20For there shall be no reward to the evil man; the candle of the wicked shall be put out.
- 21<u>My son, fear thou the LORD and the king: and meddle not with them that are given to change:</u>
- 22For their calamity shall rise suddenly; and who knoweth the ruin of them both?
- 23<u>These</u> things <u>also</u> belong <u>to the wise</u>. It is <u>not good to have</u> respect of persons in judgment.
- 24He that saith unto the wicked, Thou art righteous; him shall the people curse, nations shall abhor him:
- 25<u>But to them that rebuke</u> him <u>shall be delight, and a good</u> <u>blessing shall come upon them.</u>
- 26Every man shall kiss his lips that giveth a right answer.
- 27<u>Prepare thy work without, and make it fit for thyself in the</u> field; and afterwards build thine house.
- 28Be not a witness against thy neighbour without cause; and deceive not with thy lips.
- 29<u>Say not, I will do so to him as he hath done to me: I will render to the man according to his work.</u>
- 30<u>I went by the field of the slothful, and by the vineyard of the man void of understanding;</u>
- 31<u>And, lo, it was all grown over with thorns, and nettles had</u> covered the face thereof, and the stone wall thereof was broken down.
- 32<u>Then I saw, and considered it well: I looked upon it, and received instruction.</u>
- 33Yet<u>a little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands</u> to sleep:
- 34<u>So shall thy poverty come as one that travelleth; and thy</u> want as an armed man.

1<u>These</u> are <u>also proverbs of Solomon, which the men of</u> <u>Hezekiah king of Judah copied out.</u>

- 2It is the glory of God to conceal a thing: but the honour of kings is to search out a matter.
- 3The heaven for height, and the earth for depth, and the heart of kings is unsearchable.
- 4Take away the dross from the silver, and there shall come forth a vessel for the finer.
- 5Take away the wicked from before the king, and his throne shall be established in righteousness.
- 6<u>Put not forth thyself in the presence of the king, and stand not in the place of great men:</u>
- 7For better it is that it be said unto thee, Come up hither; than that thou shouldest be put lower in the presence of the prince whom thine eyes have seen.
- 8<u>Go not forth hastily to strive, lest</u> thou know not <u>what to do in</u> the end thereof, when thy neighbour hath put thee to shame.
- 9<u>Debate thy cause with thy neighbour</u> himself; and discover not a secret to another:
- 10<u>Lest he that heareth it put thee to shame, and thine infamy turn not away.</u>
- 11<u>A word fitly spoken</u> is like <u>apples of gold in pictures of silver.</u>
 12As <u>an earring of gold, and an ornament of fine gold,</u> so is <u>a</u>
 wise reprover upon an obedient ear.
- 13<u>As the cold of snow in the time of harvest,</u> so is <u>a faithful</u> messenger to them that send him: for he refresheth the soul of his masters.
- 14<u>Whoso boasteth himself of a false gift</u> is like <u>clouds and wind</u> without rain.
- 15By long forbearing is a prince persuaded, and a soft tongue breaketh the bone.
- 16<u>Hast thou found honey? eat so much as is sufficient for thee, lest thou be filled therewith, and vomit it.</u>
- 17Withdraw thy foot from thy neighbour's house; lest he be weary of thee, and so hate thee.
- 18<u>A man that beareth false witness against his neighbour</u> is <u>a</u> maul, and a sword, and a sharp arrow.
- 19<u>Confidence in an unfaithful man in time of trouble</u> is like <u>a</u> <u>broken tooth, and a foot out of joint.</u>
- 20As <u>he that taketh away a garment in cold weather,</u> and as <u>vinegar upon nitre</u>, so is <u>he that singeth songs to an heavy</u> heart.

- 21<u>If thine enemy be hungry, give him bread to eat; and if he be thirsty, give him water to drink:</u>
- 22 For thou shalt heap coals of fire upon his head, and the LORD shall reward thee.
- 23The north wind driveth away rain: so doth an angry countenance a backbiting tongue.
- 24It is <u>better to dwell in the corner of the housetop, than with a</u> <u>brawling woman and in a wide house.</u>
- 25As cold waters to a thirsty soul, so is good news from a far country.
- 26A righteous man falling down before the wicked is as a troubled fountain, and a corrupt spring.
- <mark>27It is <u>not good to eat much honey: so</u> for men<u>to search their</u> <u>own glory</u> is not <u>glory.</u></mark>
- 28<u>He that hath no rule over his own spirit</u> is like <u>a city</u> that is broken down, and without walls.

- 1As snow in summer, and as rain in harvest, so honour is not seemly for a fool.
- 2As the bird by wandering, as the swallow by flying, so the curse causeless shall not come.
- 3A whip for the horse, a bridle for the ass, and a rod for the fool's back.
- 4<u>Answer not a fool according to his folly, lest thou also be like</u> unto him.
- <u>5Answer a fool according to his folly, lest he be wise in his own conceit.</u>
- 6<u>He that sendeth a message by the hand of a fool cutteth off the feet, and drinketh damage.</u>
- 7<u>The legs of the lame are not equal: so is a parable in the mouth</u> of fools.
- 8<u>As he that bindeth a stone in a sling, so is he that giveth</u> honour to a fool.
- 9As <u>a thorn goeth up into the hand of a drunkard, so is a parable in the mouth of fools.</u>

- 10<u>The great</u> God<u>that formed all</u> things <u>both rewardeth the fool, and rewardeth transgressors.</u>
- 11As a dog returneth to his vomit, so a fool returneth to his folly.
 12Seest thou a man wise in his own conceit? there is more hope of a fool than of him.
- 13<u>The slothful</u> man <u>saith</u>, There is <u>a lion in the way; a lion is in</u> the streets.
- 14As the door turneth upon his hinges, so doth the slothful upon his bed.
- 15<u>The slothful hideth his hand in his bosom; it grieveth him to bring it again to his mouth.</u>
- 16<u>The sluggard</u> is <u>wiser in his own conceit than seven men that</u> can render a reason.
- 17<u>He that passeth by, and meddleth with strife</u> belonging <u>not to him,</u> is like <u>one that taketh a dog by the ears.</u>
- 18<u>As a mad man who casteth firebrands, arrows, and death,</u>
- 19<u>So</u> is <u>the man</u> that <u>deceiveth his neighbour, and saith, Am not</u> <u>I in sport?</u>
- 20 Where no wood is, there the fire goeth out: so where there is no talebearer, the strife ceaseth.
- 21As coals are to burning coals, and wood to fire; so is a contentious man to kindle strife.
- 22<u>The words of a talebearer are as wounds, and they go down into the innermost parts of the belly.</u>
- 23<u>Burning lips and a wicked heart</u> are like <u>a potsherd covered</u> with silver dross.
- 24<u>He that hateth dissembleth with his lips, and layeth up deceit</u> within him;
- 25When he speaketh fair, believe him not: for there are seven abominations in his heart.
- 26Whose <u>hatred is covered by deceit, his wickedness shall be</u> <u>shewed before the</u> whole <u>congregation</u>.
- 27Whoso diggeth a pit shall fall therein: and he that rolleth a stone, it will return upon him.
- 28<u>A lying tongue hateth</u> those that are <u>afflicted by it; and a</u> <u>flattering mouth worketh ruin.</u>

Proverbs

Chapter 27

Pathway to Redemption

No doubt, that if we take heed to the councils of Solomon that we are on our way to the "Pathway to Redemption".

Redemption that is in Christ Jesus. Solomon wasn't just a wise man; he was gifted to be the wises' of all men. As the Lord said to Solomon in 1st Kings 3:12 Behold, I have done according to thy words: lo, I have given thee a wise and an understanding heart; so that there was none like thee before thee, neither after thee shall any arise like unto thee. Here is where wisdom and knowledge come together. Therefore we are counseled in chapter 2 "1My son, if thou wilt receive my words, and hide my commandments with thee; 2So that thou incline thine ear unto wisdom, and apply thine heart to understanding; 3Yea, if thou criest after knowledge, and liftest up thy voice for understanding; 4If thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for

her as for hid treasures; 5Then shalt thou understand the fear of the LORD, and find the knowledge of God. 6For the LORD giveth wisdom: out of his mouth cometh knowledge and understanding". Having this knowledge and understanding in your tool box in searching for truth will put you on a platform of sound judgement and prepare you for the final crisis that is just ahead of us. Know this, we of ourselves cannot gain any merit to gain salvation. It's a gift of God when we accept Jesus as the only begotten of the Father for the remission of our sins. Romans: 3:25 says, "Whom God hath set forth [to be] a propitiation through faith in his blood, to declare his righteousness for the remission of sins that are past, through the forbearance of God";

Let's see how wisdom and knowledge work together when dealing with Faith and Works - Hand in Hand

In; SIGNS OF THE TIMES ARTICLE, JULY 21, 1890, TITLED "WHAT SHALL I DO TO INHERIT ETERNAL LIFE?" We Read:

Jesus died to save His people from their sins, and redemption in Christ means to cease the transgression of the law of God and to be free from every sin; no heart that is stirred with enmity against the law of God is in harmony with Christ, who suffered on Calvary to vindicate and exalt the law before the universe. {FW 95.1}

Those who make bold assumptions of holiness give proof in this that they do not see themselves in the light of the law; they are not spiritually enlightened, and they do not loathe every species of selfishness and pride. From their sin-stained lips fall the contradictory utterances: "I am holy, I am sinless. Jesus teaches me that if I keep the law I am fallen from grace. The law is a yoke of bondage." The Lord says, "Blessed are they that do His commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city." We should study the Word of God carefully that we may come to right decisions, and act accordingly; for then we shall obey the Word and be in harmony with God's holy law. {FW 95.2}

Not Saved by Law Nor in Disobedience

While we are to be in harmony with God's law, we are not saved by the works of the law, yet we cannot be saved without obedience. The law is the standard by which character is measured. But we cannot possibly keep the commandments of God without the regenerating grace of Christ. Jesus alone can cleanse us from all sin. He does not save us by law, neither will

He save us in disobedience to law. {FW 95.3}

Our love to Christ will be in proportion to the depth of our conviction of sin, and by the law is the knowledge of sin. But as we see ourselves, let us look away to Jesus, who gave Himself for us that He might redeem us from all iniquity. By faith take hold of the merits of Christ, and the soul-cleansing blood will be applied. The more clearly we see the evils and perils to which we have been exposed, the more grateful shall we be for deliverance through Christ. The gospel of Christ does not give men license to break the law, for it was through transgression that the floodgates of woe were opened upon our world. {FW 96.1}

Today sin is the same malignant thing that it was in the time of Adam. The gospel does not promise the favor of God to anyone who in impenitence breaks His law. The depravity of the human heart, the guilt of transgression, the ruin of sin, are all made plain by the cross where Christ has made for us a way of escape. {FW 96.2}

A Doctrine Full of Deception

Self-righteousness is the danger of this age; it separates the soul from Christ. Those who trust to their own righteousness cannot understand how salvation comes through Christ. They call sin righteousness and righteousness sin. They have no appreciation of the evil of transgression, no understanding of the terror of the law; for they do not respect God's moral standard. The reason there are so many spurious conversions in these days is that there is so low an appreciation of the law of God. Instead of God's standard of righteousness, men have

erected a standard of their own by which to measure character. They see through a glass darkly and present false ideas of sanctification to the people, thus encouraging egotism, pride and self-righteousness. The doctrine of sanctification advocated by many is full of deception, because it is flattering to the natural heart; but the kindest thing that can be preached to the

sinner is the truth of the binding claims of the law of God. Faith and works must go hand in hand; for faith without works is dead, being alone. {FW 96.3}

The Test of Doctrine

The prophet declares a truth by which we may test all doctrine. He says, "To the law and to the testimony: if they speak not according to this word, it is because there is no light in them" (Isaiah 8:20). Although error abounds in the world, there is no reason why men need remain in deception. The truth is plain, and when it is contrasted with error, its character may be discerned. All the subjects of God's grace may understand what is required of them. By faith we may conform our lives to the standard of righteousness, because we can appropriate to ourselves the righteousness of Christ. {FW 97.1}

In the Word of God the honest seeker for truth will find the rule for genuine sanctification. The apostle says: "There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. . . . For what the law could not do, in that it was weak through the flesh, God sending His own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and for sin, condemned sin in the flesh; that the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. For they that are after the flesh do mind the things of the flesh; but they that are after the Spirit the things of the Spirit. For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be. So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God. But ye are not in the flesh, but in the Spirit, if so be that the Spirit of God dwell in you" (Romans 8:1-9). {FW 97.2}

By taking to account the proverbs of Solomon and making it your standard of life, your decision making will guide you through the time of trouble where "Life & Death" issues matters. For example: "The Mark of The Beast", with so many interpretations out there who is correct? Again, this is where wisdom and understanding come together. See how the Bible gives direction on finding the answer in the book of Revelation chapter 12: Here is wisdom. Let him that hath understanding count the number of the beast: for it is the number of a man; and his number is Six hundred threescore and six. Knowing the correct meaning can make all the difference of what is the true understanding of that verse. See how both wisdom & understanding is used. Now do you see why Solomon stresses the point to know wisdom and instruction; to perceive the words of understanding?

Redemption In Christ Jesus

Faith & Works Chapter 16 (1979) Accepted in Christ

ARTICLE IN SIGNS OF THE TIMES, JULY 4, 1892.

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). This message is for the world, for "whosoever" means that any and all who comply with the condition may share the blessing. All who look unto Jesus, believing in Him as their personal Saviour, shall "not perish, but have everlasting life." Every provision has been made that we may have the everlasting reward. {FW 105.1}

Christ is our Sacrifice, our Substitute, our Surety, our divine intercessor; He is made unto us righteousness, sanctification, and redemption. "For Christ is not entered into the holy places made with hands, which are the figures of the true; but into

heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God for us" (Hebrews 9:24). {FW 105.2}

The intercession of Christ in our behalf is that of presenting His divine merits in the offering of Himself to the Father as our substitute and surety; for He ascended up on high to make an atonement for our transgressions. "If any man sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and He is the propitiation for our sins; and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world" (1 John 2:1, 2). "Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us, and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins" (1 John 4:10). "He is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them" (Hebrews 7:25). {FW 105.3}

From these scriptures it is evident that it is not God's will 106

that you should be distrustful and torture your soul with the fear that God will not accept you because you are sinful and unworthy. "Draw nigh to God, and He will draw nigh to you" (James 4:8). Present your case before Him, pleading the merits of the blood shed for you upon Calvary's cross. Satan will accuse you of being a great sinner, and you must admit this, but uou can sau: "I know I am a sinner, and that is the reason I need a Saviour. Jesus came into the world to save sinners. 'The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin' (1 John 1:7). 'If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness' (verse 9). I have no merit or goodness whereby I may claim salvation, but I present before God the all-atoning blood of the spotless Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world. This is my only plea. The name of Jesus gives me access to the Father. His ear, His heart, is open to my faintest pleading, and He supplies my deepest necessities." {FW 105.4}

This Is Justification

It is the righteousness of Christ that makes the penitent sinner acceptable to God and works his justification. However sinful has been his life, if he believes in Jesus as his personal Saviour, he stands before God in the spotless robes of Christ's imputed righteousness. {FW 106.1}

The sinner so recently dead in trespasses and sins is quickened by faith in Christ. He sees by faith that Jesus is his Saviour, and alive forevermore, able to save unto "the uttermost [all] that come unto God by Him." In the atonement made for him the believer sees such breadth and length and height and depth of efficiency--sees such completeness of salvation, purchased at such infinite cost, that his soul is filled with praise and thanksgiving. He sees as in a glass the glory of the Lord and is changed into the same image as by the Spirit of the Lord. He sees the robe of Christ's righteousness, woven in the loom of heaven, wrought by His obedience, and imputed to

the repenting soul through faith in His name. {FW 106.2}

When the sinner has a view of the matchless charms of Jesus, sin no longer looks attractive to him; for he beholds the Chiefest among ten thousand, the One altogether lovely. He realizes by a personal experience the power of the gospel, whose vastness of design is equaled only by its preciousness of purpose. {FW 107.1}

We have a living Saviour. He is not in Joseph's new tomb; He is risen from the dead and has ascended on high as a Substitute and Surety for every believing soul. "Therefore, being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:1). The sinner is justified through the merits of Jesus, and this is God's acknowledgment of the perfection of the ransom paid for man. That Christ was obedient even unto the death of the cross is a pledge of the repenting sinner's acceptance with the Father. Then shall we permit ourselves to have a vacillating experience of doubting and believing, believing and doubting? Jesus is the pledge of our acceptance with God. We stand in favor before God, not because of any merit in ourselves, but because of our faith in "the Lord our righteousness." {FW 107.2}

Jesus stands in the holy of holies, now to appear in the presence of God for us. There He ceases not to present His people moment by moment, complete in Himself. But because we are thus represented before the Father, we are not to imagine that we are to presume upon His mercy and become

careless, indifferent, and self-indulgent. Christ is not the minister of sin. We are complete in Him, accepted in the Beloved, only as we abide in Him by faith. {FW 107.3}

Perfection through our own good works we can never attain. The soul who sees Jesus by faith, repudiates his own righteousness. He sees himself as incomplete, his repentance insufficient, his strongest faith but feebleness, his most costly sacrifice as meager, and he sinks in humility at the foot of the cross. But a voice speaks to him from the oracles of God's

Word. In amazement he hears the message, "Ye are complete in Him." Now all is at rest in his soul. No longer must he strive to find some worthiness in himself, some meritorious deed by which to gain the favor of God. {FW 107.4}

A Truth Hard to Grasp

Beholding the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world, he finds the peace of Christ; for pardon is written against his name, and he accepts the Word of God, "Ye are complete in Him" (Colossians 2:10). How hard is it for humanity, long accustomed to cherish doubt, to grasp this great truth! But what peace it brings to the soul, what vital life! In looking to ourselves for righteousness, by which to find acceptance with God, we look to the wrong place, "for all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). We are to look to Jesus; for "we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory" (2 Corinthians 3:18). You are to find your completeness by beholding the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world. {FW 108.1}

Standing before the broken law of God, the sinner cannot cleanse himself; but, believing in Christ, he is the object of His infinite love and clothed in His spotless righteousness. For those who believe in Christ, Jesus prayed: "Sanctify them through Thy truth: Thy word is truth: . . . that they all may be one; as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be one in Us, that the world may believe that Thou hast sent me. And the glory which Thou gavest Me I have given them; that they may be one, even as We are one" (John 17:17-

22). "O righteous Father, the world hath not known Thee: but I have known Thee, and these have known that Thou hast sent Me. And I have declared unto them Thy name, and will declare it: that the love wherewith Thou hast loved Me may be in them, and I in them" (verses 25, 26). {FW 108.2}

Who can comprehend the nature of that righteousness

which makes the believing sinner whole, presenting him to God without spot or wrinkle or any such thing? We have the pledged word of God that Christ is made unto us righteousness, sanctification, and redemption. God grant that we may rely upon His word with implicit trust, and enjoy His richest blessing. "For the Father Himself loveth you, because ye have loved Me, and have believed that I came out from God" (John 16:27). {FW 108.3}


It is by wisdom and understanding that these words mean anything. To understand this comes with the knowledge of God's word. We are told in 2nd Timothy 2:15 Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. And in chapter 3 Timothy goes on to say: 3:16 All scripture [is] given by inspiration of God, and [is] profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness:

3:17 That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works. This is how we make it right with God.

So, where do I stand?

Looking to myself, I find myself a sinner sold under sin. But looking to Jesus I find hope in the blood He shed for me. Because He lives, I can face tomorrow and because He lives my fears are gone. Knowing that God the Father loves me so much He was willing to let His only begotten son to die for my sins and Jesus willing to lay down His life for me. Where do I stand? In awe!! Who am I that God is so mindful of me? Where do I stand in the Kingdom of God? Only God Knows. I know I am far from the righteousness of John the Baptist. If I am found with favor, any place in the kingdom of God would do, as long as I am there. Thank you, Father, thank you Jesus for loving me

and those you gave your life for. Glory be to your name forever. Amen



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
